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### Trailblazer Provides Funding for New Community Project in Lincoln Parish

Project Provides NE Louisiana With New Venue for Community Sports Development and Competition

Archers will soon have an opportunity to sharpen their skills at a new 3D archery range in Lincoln Parish. The Lincoln Parish Police Jury has dedicated a 10-acre tract of land in the Lincoln Parish Park for the new range. Located north of Ruston on Highway 33, the Lincoln Parish Park will offer three-dimensional foam targets of most of the wild species native to our area to test the skills of recreational archers and provide bowhunters an opportunity to fine tune their bows in preparation for hunting season.

"The archery range is being made possible by a collaborative effort among the Lincoln Parish Police Jury, Trailblazer RC&D, corporate sponsorships, and individual donations," said Glenn Scriber, Lincoln Parish District 6 Police Juror. "Trailblazer RC&D committed foundation funding of \$8,000 to the archery range in support of development of a community-based, sustainable recreational opportunity for Lincoln Parish and the surrounding areas." Scriber represents the Lincoln Parish Police Jury on the Trailblazer Board of Directors.

#### Archery in Louisiana Schools

The Archery in Louisiana Schools (ALAS) program is an affiliate of the National Archery in the Schools program (NASP) and is sponsored in Louisiana by the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF). This program introduces students in grades 4-12 to international target style archery. It is taught as part of the school's curriculum, usually during physical education classes. Students who attend a school that participates in the ALAS program are eligible to compete in ALAS and NASP sanctioned competitions. "Archery is a growing sport all across Louisiana," said Bob Brotherton, President of the Trailblazer RC&D Board of Directors. "It is very popular in our public schools with students shooting in 4-H clubs and archery teams, and the Lincoln Parish range will be a tremendous benefit for Lincoln Parish and surrounding parishes."

A typical archery range uses flat targets. A 3D archery range, such as the one being constructed in Lincoln Parish, uses three-dimensional animal targets to challenge archers at each station. 3D archery competitions attract thousands of archers in events across the nation.

Brotherton is also the District 1 Police Juror in Bossier Parish, and he shared that a similar range is being planned by the Bossier and Webster Parish Police Juries. "We are working with Camp Minden in Webster Parish to develop a 3D range there so we can host competitive events," said Brotherton. "I went to Paris, Texas, with representatives of the Shreveport-Bossier Sports Commission to check out the venue for the 3D Archery Championships, and I saw 1,500-2,000 enthusiastic competitors shooting at 3D targets."

In coming months, community organizations will work together with the Lincoln Parish Police Jury to put the finishing touches on the new archery range. It is anticipated the range will be open by September 1, if not sooner. Fees, hours of operation, and range rules are currently being finalized, and will be made available when the range opens. The Lincoln Parish 3D Archery Range will be maintained by the Lincoln Parish Police Jury, a board consisting of Police Jury members and area citizens, along with input from the Lincoln Parish Parks, Recreation, and Tourism Committee. 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# POORLY MANAGED FOREST ROADS ARE DETRIMENTAL TO WATER QUALITY

Forest roads are a necessary part of managing a forest. They are used for planting, harvesting, managing the timber, fire protection, recreation, basically, all access to the land. Forest roads can be temporary and used only to accomplish a specific project or permanent with a gravel surface for year-round use. Whatever the design or use, a poorly constructed or poorly maintained forest road can be the largest source of nonpoint source pollution.

Implementing Best Management Practices (BMPs) on your forest roads can save you from expensive erosion repairs and degraded water quality.

#### NRCS Online Services Available with eAuth Account

Online services are available to customers with an eAuth account, which provides access to the farmers.gov offsite link where producers can view USDA farm loan information and payments and view and track certain USDA program applications and payments. Customers who do not already have an eAuth account can enroll at farmers.gov/sign-in. Online NRCS services are available to customers through the Conservation Client Gateway link which can be found at www.nrcs.usda.gov. Customers can track payments, report completed practices, request conservation assistance and electronically sign documents.
