## Do You Have A FOREST2

If you have an acre or more of land with trees on at least 10 percent of it, you have a forest. If you own that forest as an individual, a couple, a family partnership, or some other grouping of unincorporated individuals, you are a family forest owner.

#### **Help for Forest Landowners**

Through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) provides financial and technical assistance to implement conservation practices that address natural resource concerns on private forest land; conservation practices such as:

- Forest Management Plan
- Forest Stand Improvement
- Prescribed Burning
- Brush Management
- Herbaceous Weed Control
- Tree/Shrub Site Preparation
- Tree/Shrub Establishment
- Access Control
- Riparian Forest Buffer

#### Louisiana Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative Receives Agreement Approval

In April, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced awards of \$12 million in cooperative agreements for 49 projects that expand access to conservation technical assistance for livestock producers and increase the use of conservation practices on grazing lands. The funding is provided through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS) Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative (GLCI).

Louisiana Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative, Inc., received one of these awards for their efforts to develop Louisiana conservation leaders. Their project seeks to build leaders in conservation through in-depth expert trainings. They plan to expand partnerships and digital resources through outreach and videos, strengthen their relationship with NRCS, allow agents to receive credits in their home state, and remove financial barriers for underserved producers to attend national events. #### **Wildlife Forum and Field Day**

The LSU AgCenter will be hosting a Wildlife Forum and Field Day on Friday, May 12, 2023, from 8:30 a.m. until noon at the LSU AgCenter, Northeast Research Station, 4589 Highway 605, St. Joseph, Louisiana. Featured topics for this field day will be chronic wasting disease, feral hog management, avian influenza, soil fertility, native habitat management techniques, and roadside plant management. This field day is a free event that will benefit private landowners, wildlife managers, avid outdoorsmen, lease holders, wildlife enthusiasts and natural resource professionals. #### Eleven Deer Tested Positive for CWD During 2022-2023 Hunting Season

Eleven deer tested positive for chronic wasting disease (CWD) in Tensas Parish during the 2022-23 hunting season, bringing Louisiana's total to 12 cases since the discovery of the disease in January of 2022. All 12 positive tests were in Tensas Parish.

A total of 2,370 hunter-harvested deer were tested for CWD in Louisiana during the 2022-23 season. The Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF) discovered the state's first case of CWD in a hunter-harvested deer in Tensas Parish during the 2021-22 hunting season. LDWF established a CWD Control Area around the index case.



CWD is a neurodegenerative disease of white-tailed deer and other members of the family Cervidae. It is caused by a prion, an infectious, misfolded protein particle, and is 100 percent fatal in affected deer after an indeterminate incubation period. There is no treatment or preventative vaccine for CWD.

CWD is transmitted between deer through saliva, urine, feces, and decomposing infected carcasses. CWD-infected deer may exhibit signs of weight loss and emaciation, salivation, frequent drinking and urination, incoordination, circling, and lack of fear of people.

Although CWD has not been shown to be contagious to humans, the Centers for Disease Control and the World Health Organization recommend against human consumption of deer known to be infected with CWD. In addition, it is recommended that people hunting in areas known to harbor CWD-infected deer have their deer tested for the disease prior to consuming the animals.

LDWF will continue to test sick deer and hunter-harvested deer for CWD. LDWF will provide testing of hunter-harvested deer by request, free of charge at this time. To learn more about CWD and complete regulations, go to: https://www.wlf.louisiana.gov/pag e/cwd
