ROSE GROWING TIPS

Everything is Coming Up ROSES!

Roses are some of the most beautiful flowers in the world with stunning blooms and amazing scents and colors.

However, a lot of gardeners shy away from growing roses because they require a bit of maintenance. In recent years, new rose varieties have been released that require less maintenance and make rose growing easier. Some easy-to-grow varieties for a low-maintenance garden include knock-out roses and drift roses, but even these roses need periodic maintenance in order to thrive.

Rose Growing Tips

- **1**. Choose a rose variety that is disease resistant and appropriate to your USDA hardiness zone.
- 2. Place roses in a sunny area with well-drained soil: 6-8 hours of sunlight daily.
- 3. Prune in early spring after the last hard frost to remove any dead/dying/diseased areas and revitalize your rose.
- 4. Water established roses deeply once or twice a week. Check newly planted roses daily to determine if they need water.
- 5. Always water at the base of the plant. Do not wet the leaves. Wet leaves can be an invitation to disease.
- 6. Do research, ask experts, attend workshops (shameless plug).

The Gardens of the American Rose Center, located near Shreveport, Louisiana, are the nation's largest park dedicated to roses.

Home to the national headquarters of the American Rose Society, the gardens are open to visitors and feature a large variety of roses, companion plants, sculptures, and fountains.

TREE PLANTING TIME

Add PEARS, ACORNS, and CHESTNUTS to Your Wildlife Habitat Now is the time to plant!

Tree plots are great additions to your wildlife habitat. They add diversity, wildlife cover, and an additional food source for wildlife. While some trees will take 10-15 years to mature, many will provide fruit or forage within a few years of planting.

- Choose trees that provide nutrition for deer and are suitable for Louisiana; such as cow oak, white oak, pecan, hickory, Dunstan chestnut, pear, black cherry, crabapple, and persimmon.
- Plan the location of your tree plots to complement your existing food plot plantings, with annual maintenance access in mind.
- Protect young tree seedlings with cages, as deer will eat the leaves, twigs, and buds of your newly planted trees. This will impact tree growth.
- 1. February is the perfect time to plant your new wildlife tree plot—and to learn more about wildlife habitats (another shameless plug).
