

About the Solar Eclipse

Dear Friends.

On April 8, 2024, people in the United States will see the first solar eclipse in the continental U.S. in 7 years. Some people even say this eclipse has biblical significance. Check out these facts:

Trailblaze

- Everyone in the continental U.S. will see at least a partial eclipse.
- 2. The first person to see the total eclipse in the U.S. will be in Las Quintas Fronterizas, Texas, at 1:27:21 p.m. CDT.
- 3. The center line of the eclipse will cross through 15 states.
- 4. The eclipse lasts 4 minutes 28 seconds.

During the eclipse, the few minutes of darkness will trigger a small change in nature, slowing down photosynthesis. Do you think it will impact your lawn? Bet you never thought about it. Lawn Care Basics

It's SPRING! Grass is growing! Mowers are coming out, and lawns are demanding our time! Basic lawn care involves fertilization, watering, mowing, and MORE!



Lawn care also includes thatch control, insect control, lawn diseases, and weeds.

Fertilization

- A fertilized lawn is more resistant to weeds and pests and will recover better from stress.
- Soil testing is key to determining a fertilization plan for your lawn.
- Soil should be retested every three years.

Watering

- A healthy lawn requires an adequate supply of soil moisture.
- Irrigate to moisten the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches.
- The best time to water is in the morning.

Mowing

- Do not remove more than the top one-third of the grass when mowing.
- Rotary blade mowers should have the blades sharpened 1-3 times each growing season.
- Removal of grass clippings is not necessary as long as you mow regularly.

Weed in Focus:

Smilax (deer thorn, catbrier)

Smilax vines are one of the toughest perennial vines that gardeners have to deal with. They have a thorny vine with waxy, heart-shaped leaves. It grows in moist shade, and it is an important food source and habitat for wildlife, including birds, rabbits, and deer. Smilax vines are very difficult to control. Herbicides can be used, but multiple applications are needed.
